Difference:

but, yet, however, nevertheless, on the other hand,

whereas, in contrast, although, even though, despite,

in spite of, still, though

Examples:

for example, for instance, to illustrate

Emphasis:

especially, mainly, primarily

Time:

at the same time, while, later, earlier, then, before, behind,

here, there, next

Cause:

because, consequently, since, therefore

Conclusion:

finally, at last, after all, in conclusion, to conclude

Space:

above, beyond, on top of, under, alongside, upon,

beneath, to the left/right
