## Quoting Shakespeare:

#### First:

The play is a 5 act play, meaning you must <u>UNDERLINE</u> it when you make reference to it:

Ex:

In William Shakespeare's <u>Romeo and Juliet</u>, Romeo is an easily corrupted character, whose youth and inexperience contribute to his downfall.

## Second:

Whenever you quote from the play, you must first introduce who is speaking and then reference the ACT: SCENE: LINE NUMBER so that we know where he/she spoke it.

EX:

As Tybalt says, "What drawn and talk of peace? I hate the word/ As I hate hell, all Montagues, and thee. Have at the coward!" (I:I: 60-63)

## **Third**

When a quote is more than one line you must put a slash in it to represent the line break.

Ex: Romeo is immediately shown as a lover in the opening act: "Why then, O brawling love, O loving hate!/ O anything, of nothing first create!" (Act I:I: 186-189).

# Finally

If you have a quote that is four lines or more, you must block quote. In this case, **you MUST INDENT THE QUOTE**, you don't have to use **"quotation marks"** and you must introduce the quote with a **Colon**:

Ex: Romeo explains:

Why, such is love's transgression.
Griefs of mine own lie heavy in my breast,
Which though wilt propagate, to have it pressed
With more of thine. This love that thou has shown
Doth add more grief to too much of mine own. (I:I: 179-183)
